We would like to add our voices to support for the town code amendments related to solar installation being considered during the Kittery public hearing on April 11, 2022.

Adoption of solar of all types, as well as other renewal energy sources, is very important for the preservation of our environment and to reduce our dependence on energy sources such as coal and oil.

Solar is an especially important source of renewable energy, as it is an investment that can be made by private citizens without much added effort from public infrastructure.

Encouraging the use of solar, including ground-based solar, is important for Kittery as it helps residents positively contribute to the environment and contribute to the green spaces of Kittery.

I was hoping for some clarification during tonight's meeting on where parking will be allowed on Norton Rd if the 2-3 proposed parking spots have been filled. I thought since it was a public road that parking is permissible on the side of the road. 2-3 spots is a low number given the size of the preserve, so an indication of where else on Norton people can park would be helpful. I am aware there is additional parking and access to the reserve through York, however if we are wanting to access the Kittery Land Trust it can be 1-2 miles from the York parking areas before you have even entered Kittery land.
