- I. Call to Order & Welcome: 6:01 pm
- II. Public Comment & Board Presentations none
- III. Modified Consent Agenda
 - **A.** March 17, 2021 Meeting Notes-Approved with no amendments
 - **B.** Reports & Committee Updates
 - KCC Director's Report/Updates April (see attached). In addition, Jeremy noted:
 - On average, we will be servicing 16 students at KCC while another 16 are taken to a farm.
 - Three KCC staff will structure activities and time for homework for those students remaining at KCC. To accommodate these students, we may be moving rooms currently assigned to other programs. We have requested help from White Pines and The Stem Program. On Fridays, all student groups will be going to Rogers Park
 - We are expecting three groups of about 30 each for Summer Camps.
 - Summer Entertainment Program: Booking entertainment Tuesday-Fridays; working with the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard during 6 weeks of the summer; movies will be offered on Wednesdays; Drika and The Dance Hall will offer programs on Thursdays.
 - Seacoast Community Fridge: This is volunteer driven with local restaurants volunteering to build a facility by the Bike Rack out back. Community members have done their homework and determined that one central location works well. Our cameras will help monitoring as access will be 24/7.
 - Seacoast Rep has requested to return with programs running June to mid-August.
 - C. VAC Meeting Notes/Update April (see attached) In addition, Rose reported:
 - The committee has lost 3 members and is looking for new members. They are seeking an educated to serve.
 Most are reluctant since the meetings are held at 8:15 am. It would be mean moving meetings to the evening.
 Brian suggested contacting the Art Education Association of Maine for possible references.
 - VAC is still working on the Walking Track project. They have estimated each display could run to \$150 with approximately 6 pieces being displayed. Sponsors were mentioned as a way to cover costs. The project is loosely connected to the 375th Celebration but the Town has not set aside a fund for the 375th.
 - While the KCC will work with VAC, its budget is tightly controlled and leaves little room for unexpected expenses. It was suggested that an endowment be established for VAC. The BOD spoke of a donation button placed on the KCC website. Rose questioned whether VAC, not a 501C-3, could receive donations. Steve suggested that The Supporting the Arts group, which is a 501C-3, may be the vehicle for such donations. Donations could then be easily tracked. Steve will check with Kendra.
 - It remains unclear as to the Gallery being needed for the 375th Celebration. Jeremy reported that the Celebration Committee has not met since the start of April. VAC is willing to do an exhibit in conjunction with the 375th.
 - Rose requested Climate Action Committee contact to help clarify the needs for hanging posters. Jeremy
 reported that he had met with Cameron White. It was decided to create 3-4 posters on smart foam and hang
 them on easels at the entryway.
 - VAC will be holding its May meeting in person.
 - D. KAFC Meeting Notes/Updates March (see attached) In addition, Mike reported:

- A committee to review and update the Field Reservation Policy is being formed. The committee would like a representative from the town. Jeremy volunteered to serve on it. This committee will be tabled until after the Spring. Steve will take the lead on drafting the document to be consistent with other policy documents.
- A lot of people are interested in getting out and being active. Participation has been high.
- The Ice Rink was well received. We expect to put it back up next year right after Halloween.
- KAFC will next meet on June 7.
- **E. Proposed Motion:** Mike moved that the board accept the consent agenda. Gerri seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously accepted (8 votes). The Consent Agenda was adopted.

IV. Chair's Update

- Todd was grateful for the thank-you card sent from the BOD.
- Steve reported that he would be attending a May 5th meeting regarding the school system taking over the Pre-School.

V. Discussion/Action Agenda

- **A.** Complete review of 2021 Programming Survey Results
 - As previously, Steve broke out responses and condensed them under broad categories: Sports, Special Events, Fitness/Health/Well Being, Types of Activities.
 - Sports in general for adults and youth were mentioned often. The types of sports ranged broadly: volleyball, dodgeball, basketball, pickleball, soccer, lacrosse, softball, etc. Some already exist; others may be considered. Both indoor and outdoor activities were desired. Respondents wanted to see classes, clinics as well as tournaments.
 - Fitness for all ages mentioned often, most especially Yoga for adults. Gymnastics, Tai Chi, and Pilates. Virtual exercise classes have worked during COVID and may be something to consider in the future.
 - When discussing classes, Mike suggested we needed more evening offerings. Often the problem is conflicting schedules for teachers. Dance classes most often run weekday mornings.
 - Health/Wellbeing: The Farmers Market is very well received. Other suggestions included Meditation/Mindfulness, Cooking/Nutrition for all ages, Job Fairs for teens. Other health related services were requested such as Lunch and Learn and CPR.
 - Programs/Activities: Trips to sports events, museums; Family Programs during non-work hours to accommodate the entire family. A variety of groups to focus on were suggested: seniors, teens, gender specific activities. There was a desire for summer and winter programs to be offered at varying time periods from full camps to half-day programs.
 - Special Events: These entailed often one-off events, out of the ordinary offerings, maybe offered only once a year. Examples were Pet/Animal, Children's activities, Family events. Also mentioned were Food Drives, Clothing Drives, Community Yard Sales, Holiday events, Scavenger Hunts, Antique Appraisal days, Science Fairs.
 - Facilities/Operating Policies: Steve thought this topic needed to be less program focused rather Indoor vs Outdoor.
 - Suggestions included lights for outdoors and continuing of ice rink, building an outdoor amphitheater behind the building, and outside track.
 - Inside Facility: Expansion of Fitness Center/Walking Track, Teen Game Lounge, Senior Center, Swimming Pool, Free open time for teens in the gym.
 - Administrative comments included a suggestion that the dance studio be free for members to reserve, a technology room, and more open hours during holidays/school breaks. Issues include staff that may be willing to work and the difficulty of covering all the hours required, especially with a unionized staff and budget constraints. Jeremy reported that that the center is usually open during school vacation weeks and has extended its hours to accommodate working members. Should the center be open during federal holidays, the staff would be paid overtime.

B. Discussion & Next Steps

- 1. Steve said he would send to the Board as well as to the Town Council his summary of this survey. Kendra could include it with a packet to the council in that our chosen directions have clear implications for budget.
- 2. As we continue to reflect on findings, it was suggested that VAC and KAFC can benefit from the information garnered from the survey.
- 3. It was also decided that we should survey students with a more kid friendly survey. Mike suggested using Survey Monkey and utilizing advisors to facilitate. Rose also suggested that since currently we are all so COVID focused, it would be best to wait until fall. A discussion then ensued about using Focus Groups with students and compiling the results from each group.

4. The next meeting will tentatively be planned to be in-person. Masks would be worn, and seating be six feet apart. Steve will confirm prior to the meeting.

Gap Care/School Support Program

It's a wrap! We successfully navigated the 2021-2022 schoolyear. The road from September through June was filled with twists and turns and tons of adapting to updated guidance. Activity/Program Guide

Girls Just Wanna Have Fun



- 1. April VAC meeting minutes were approved
- 2. Introduction of Amanda Kidd Schall, who is a possible new committee member, to sit in and observe our meeting, and reintroduced committee members and roles. Amanda is an artist with art gallery experience.
- Rose Eppard reviewed the April 21st meeting with KCC Board:
- a. Discussion of the need to recruit Art Educators to the committee, Val volunteered to contact the Art Educator Association and ask them to post opening. BJ has asked the KAA to post the opening in their Doodles Newsletter.
- b. Art for the Walking Tract discussion on who will fund the cost. A possible share between committee and KCC was suggested. A concern was noted about the lack of communication between committees. Steve will work with the Committee chairs to expand communication.
- c. The 375th Anniversary plans are not formulated and no money has been allocated. As such, show schedule can be reevaluated.

- e. Ideas for funding the VAC were discussed. the recent User Survey shows very positive towards the Gallery and Theatre. Exploring ideas of funding through "Supporting the Arts at KCC Endowment" and/or "Donate" button on KCC website which is under review with the town manager.

- 4. Sarah spoke about the Walking Track Historic photograph project and suggested developing a cost estimate, with 2 versions of quantity minimum/maximum amount. Sarah has access to a trove of Kittery Historic photos to choose from. Val suggested a visual proposal. Amanda suggested we evaluate the content ideas.
- Amanda asked many thought provoking questions regarding funding the Gallery. Faith suggested adding this discussion to our June agenda for further exploration.
